Let's review the history of the words attached to diamond. Do the Indians and Greeks words have the meaning yet today? The word "Diamond" comes from Greek adamao, meaning "I tame" or " subdue." The adjective "adamas" describing the hardest know substance and thus diamonds became known as the known hardest substance.



Some diamonds were appearing in the 13th century European in jewelry, along with pearls gold. They became larger and more plentiful by the 16th century when along came diamond faceting, which made them more brilliant and beautiful, thus making it the sign of wealth and importance.

Diamonds: minerals created of pure carbon; they are the hardest naturally occurring gemstone which come from deep in the earth where they have experienced, over a great length of time, tremendous pressures and temperatures. There are atoms linked to atoms to create a mighty crystal of beauty. Diamonds come from clarity of colorless to opaque to black. The lightest of blue color diamonds are most valued, while most have a tinge of yellow. Because of their extreme hardness, diamonds have a great place in industrial uses, one of which is the diamond tip saw blade. The diamonds used in industry are usually of the translucent gray or brown color.

Octahedra (*a solid figure with eight plane surfaces*), dodecahedra (*having 12 sides*), and cleavage (*structural lines along which a mineral will break up*) fragments are but a few of the various shapes rough diamonds can be found. It is a shame that of all the diamonds mined, not even half of them are of a quality to be used in jewelry. But after all they are not wasted as stated previously; the spoils go into industrial uses so we still benefit from them.

The 18th century brought discoveries of deposits in Brazil, Australia, Russia, and the United States. In 1866 in South Africa, some children brought home a rock they had found. It was rather large and proved to be quite valuable. A neighbor found it quite interesting and took it to a geologist. This led to the discovery of the world's largest location of diamonds. Then in the 20th century, an American mine near Murfreesboro, Arkansas, was open for novelty public mining for a small fee.


# **Article of Interest** Don Shurtz, Pleasant Oaks Gem and Mineral Club of Dallas

### **Regional Science and Engineering Fair**

May Snacks

The Pleasant Oaks Gem and Mineral Club applauds the efforts of all of the participants at the 2011 Regional Science and Engineering Fair with special recognition to the Pleasant Oaks Special Award winner, Taylor Volesky (Clark High School, Plano), and Pleasant Oaks Honorable Mention winners, Kailash Sivakumar (Schimelpfenig Middle School, Plano), Shishir Jessu (Coppell Middle School East, Coppell), and Caroline Hancock (Lyles Middle School, Garland).

Taylor's project, far and away the best project on geology that we have encountered at the Regional Science Fair, examined the Bandelier Tuff deposits from the Valles Caldera north of Albuquerque, NM. Not only did she examine the published data



on the number of eruptions to form the various layers of tuff, she devised he own model on how the layers were deposited. Her work was extremely well done and we hope that she will be able to visit one of our meetings and explain here project.

The honorable mention projects included a project on how sinkholes form, refraction of light, and growing purple crystals (no – not amethyst). These projects were thoughtful and showed good scientific investigation principles. I think our judges continue to be amazed at the depth of knowledge and ingenuity these young students possess.

### **INTERGEM RULES**

- I. THE PURPOSE OF THE CLUB PARTICIPATING IN INTERGEM IS TO PROMOTE THE CLUB AND TO ATTRACT NEW MEMBERS.
- II. A BONUS OF PARTICIPATION IN INTERGEM IS A CHANCE FOR CLUB MEMBERS TO SHOWCASE THEIR HOBBY TO THE PUBLIC; not to resell purchased merchandise in direct competition with paying vendors. Being able to sell your hobby produced items is the extra bonus.

#### III. EACH CLUB MEMBER WHO HELPS SET UP THE INTERGEM SHOW IS ENTITLED TO AN EQUAL SHARE OF TABLE SPACE THAT IS PROVIDED BY INTERGEM.

- A. Normal setup is Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning.
- B. Working one day is one share of table space and working two days is two shares of table space per club member. Non-members may help set up, but cannot have a table space.
- C. Booth size and/or table space is dependent upon InterGem and is out of the club's control. Booth modification must meet InterGem standards.
- D. Two or more members can pool their table space shares into one larger space.

#### IV. SHOW HOURS ARE FRIDAY 12:00 NOON - 6:00 PM, SATURDAY 10:00 AM - 6:00 PM, AND SUNDAY 10:00 AM - 5:00 PM.

- A. Table space must be stocked and manned during all show hours.
- B. If you are unable to open, attend, and/or close your space during show hours; you need to make arrangements to have another member cover for you.

#### V. MERCHANDISE OFFERED FOR SALE SHOULD BE HOBBY RELATED AND PRODUCED, COLLECTED, AND/OR MODIFIED BY THE CLUB MEMBER SELLING IT.

- A. Material purchased for resale should be kept to a minimum. If we upset the paying vendors we could lose our chance to participate in the show.
- B. Space permitting, extra space may be allotted for actively demonstrating members.
