Question of the Month – Apache Tears

From the July issue: What are Apache Tears?

Apache Tears are a nodular form of obsidian. Apache Tears can be as small as a pea or as large as a softball. Nodules of obsidian can be found in many locations, but to a purist, Apache Tears come from only one location, that being below the cliffs near Superior, AZ.



Apache Tear

In the 1870's about 75 Apache were sought for raiding settlements in Arizona. Military and volunteers followed the trail of some stolen cattle and found the Apache camp. The next morning they attacked the Apache. It is said that 50 of the Apache were killed by the first volley of gunfire. The remaining Apache were chased back into the hills. The Apache found themselves hemmed in by the military and by cliffs. Rather than fall to the military, the Apache chose to ride to their death by riding their horses over the cliffs. The wives and families of the Apache came to the base of the cliffs to morn their lost men. The legend is that their tears turned to stone as the tears fell to the earth forming the Apache Tears. Another take on this legend is that the Indian Gods took the tears shed by the women and put them inside the black stones. Thus only the obsidian nodules found at the base of Big Pacacho or Apache Leap Mountain are considered to be the true Apache Tears. I suspect, however, that the vast majority of the Apache

Tears available at rock shops and shows are from many locations other than near Apache Leap Mountain.

Apache Tears are considered to be good luck charms – strange for a stone with such a tragic legend about its formation. People who posses an Apache Tear are also said to never be required to cry again as the Apache maidens have all ready cried for you. Apache Tears are said to bring the forces of nature into balance, to bring success in business, to promote clear vision, and to enhance psychic powers.



Big Pacacho or Apache Leap Mountain

As Apache Tears are a form of obsidian, their chemical composition is primarily Silicon Dioxide (SiO₂). Most Apache

Tears are dark in color, the coloring agent being iron oxide. Some Apache Tears are lighter in color and some are even translucent.

If you should decide to cut or grind an Apache Tear, one internet site warns that the Tears often have a lot of internal pressure and are prone to fracturing and even fly apart when being worked. The site recommends that they cutter wear eye protection, a good suggestion for cutting any stone.

BE SAFE - BE WELL WHAT'S IN THE BOTTLE?

In your shop, studio, garage or barn have you ever asked yourself this question? Well, I have and one situation sticks in my mind. I was putting the finishing touches on a home-built trailer that I needed to transport our basic household necessities to my first duty station when I entered the Army. A close friend came by to bid us farewell and brought with him his twoyear old son and his wife. While we admired the trailer, the little boy spotted a coke bottle sitting on one of lower beams in the garage and walked over and took a swig. The little kid choked and sputtered and cried because he wanted coke. The father then asked the question "what is in the bottle". I really wasn't sure other than I thought it was a mixture of penetrating oil of some sort. My first thought was "stupid kid" and my second thought was that I was the stupid kid for having an

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unknown, unmarked, substance in the wrong container. The best part of the story was that the kid was fine, and his mother eventually spoke to me again. It really did not have to turn out that way and I felt so fortunate. Now, I always try to label things.

During a recent "clean up campaign" in the silver studio where we teach I discovered several unknown solutions that I promptly threw away. Metalsmiths are notorious for trying new and/or different fluxes, pickle solutions or cleaners or most anything else that promises improved performance. It is absolutely imperative that we do not tolerate any unknown or unmarked material. We are always positive that we will remember exactly what we mixed up or re-packaged and put up on the shelf.

In the last class we taught I saw that a student was having a terrible time setting a cabochon in a simple piece of jewelry. After asking a few questions I learned that the student was using a strip of silver that he brought to class and assumed it was fine silver bezel material. It wasn't! It was sterling which we all know is more rigid and more difficult to set around a stone, particularly for a beginning student. The converse of this situation has also occurred when a student made prongs for a setting from fine silver when the project called for sterling silver. The setting was too flexible and would not hold the stone properly. Gremlins are always among us and miss-marked material can jump up when we least expect it.

Other prime areas for surprise include:


- Mixing or using the wrong solder.
- Confusing permanent markers with dry-erase markers.
- Mixing jewelry saw blades coarse and fine.

Well, what can we do to avoid the type of problems we have been discussing? I really do not have a fool-proof solution except for attention to detail and constant alertness. What ideas do you have?


