Southwestern Indian Jewelry by Dexter Cirillo

If you have more than a passing interest in Southwestern Indian Jewelry, and who doesn't, then this is the book for you. It is not a "how to" book, rather it is a history of the jewelry with a lot of emphasis on the people who developed and continue the development the designs and techniques. Did you know that Crazy Horse was at one time an excellent silversmith?

The book is 10 inches high by 11 inches wide and has 240 pages. About a third of the book dealing with silversmithing, a third of the book discussing lapidary, and a third of the book sculpture, all as they apply to southwest Indian jewelry. As I mentioned, the emphasis is on the people, but not the techniques. However, the book is loaded with stunning pictures – mostly of the jewelry. The pictures are close up showing a fine details. From the detailed photography you should be able to understand a lot about the techniques, should you choose to craft some pieces of you own.

This is a really nice book. I found this book in new condition at Half Price Books for considerably less than the suggested \$55.00 shown with the UPC code on the back cover.

August Birthsone: Peridot Don Shurtz, Pleasant Oaks Gem and Mineral Club



Peridot is a chemical composition of magnesium, m\iron and the silicate radical (Mg,Fe)₂SiO₄. Peridot is olive green in color, with shades varying from yellowish-green to brownish-green, but the dark olive green color is the most desirable. The shades of green depend on the amount of iron in the chemical makeup. Because of its color, peridot is sometimes confused with emerald.

Gem quality peridot is mined in the United States in North Carolina, Arizona, Hawaii (now we're talking), New Mexico, and some finds in Wyoming. Green Beach on the Big Island of Hawaii derives its color from peridot (olivine crystals) in the sand. Worldwide, peridot is also found in locations including Mexico, Brazil, China, South Africa, and other locations.

From the prospective of the Treasurer, the future of the club is about 12 years. Then the treasury will all be gone. Our major expense is our meeting room. Our major source of income is – well – we don't have a major source of income. Probably membership is our top source, but our membership is about half of what it was 5 years ago. From a personal perspective, we have become somewhat static. We have the

same little core of people who are the officers year after year. The same core people are the contributors to our newsletter. What is going on with the rest of the membership? We need (1) a lot of new members, hopefully with a slightly younger average age, (2) larger core group who get things done (which hopefully will come with the new members, (3) more outreach into the community.
