<u>Program</u>: Mark Carter presented our program by way of a DVD titled "Color In Minerals" featuring Dr. George Rossman of the California Institute of Technology. It was a 40 minute explanation on what causes the colors in crystals.

There are 4,700 known minerals. Colors come from the inter-play of minerals and ions, and radiation. Chromium causes beautiful green colors and hues, but Vanadium can cause green coloring too. Manganese is the main source contributing to the color red, however a ruby is colored red from chromium; but it also depends on the activity of the ions. The gemstone Aquamarine is a beryl and gets its' lovely blue color from iron. Iron may also cause a beryl to be golden colored. The color of pink tourmaline is from natural radiation.

After the DVD presentation we had our raffle and then the meeting was adjourned at 9:15 pm.

# Gemstone of the State

### **Star Blue Quartz:**

The Star Blue Quartz is Alabama's State Gemstone.

Blue quartz such as these contain microscopic inclusions of amphibole minerals also occasionally exhibit asterism. There is a little bit of quartz in every rock. Quartz is made of silicon dioxide (SiO2).

Most quartz is a souvenir of volcanoes, which melt silica, which is then carried by water into crevices, where it crystallizes. Such quartz often includes traces of other minerals picked up by water flowing underground.



Star Blue Quartz is one of the most beautiful gemstones on earth, and the cheapest because there are so many. There is different colored quartz. New Hampshire has smoky, South Dakota rose, Arkansas and Georgia star blue. Quartz is made into glass, eyeglasses, electrical components, abrasives, and gemstone and building stone.

**Blue** (Or gray/lavender): A good healing stone for linking heart with throat and brow Chakra to expand self expression and creativity, plus refining communication skill to new levels. Eases throat tension. Immune system, thyroid, iodine and B Vitamin use.

One of the more important rock-forming minerals is Quartz (silicon dioxide) and is prominent in sand, gravel, sandstone, some types of

metamorphic as well as igneous rocks. Usually clear and colorless but may be found in brown, white, pink, yellow or red, and when found to have impurities, may be found in purple. Small quartz crystals can be found in limestone cavities of rocks in north Alabama. Found in east Alabama, large quartz crystals, associated with the coarse-grained rocks known as pegmatite, have been found. The most extensive finds have been along the Coastal Plain section in an area from Dallas County through Montgomery County and into Russell County. The main source of sand and gravel in the state, located in the Coastal Plain section of south-central Alabama, is in the Montgomery district. These deposits mainly occur in terrace flood plain deposits of the Alabama, Coosa, and Tallapoosa rivers bordering Montgomery, Autauga, Lowndes, Elmore, and Macon counties.

# Birthstone of the Month: Aquamarine

Observing the aquamarine and its color, almost a sea water color, you can see where it gets its Latin name. It is a member of the beryl family but it is very rare to see a darker aqua than the Swiss Blue Topaz. The color ranges of aquamarine are dependent upon the concentrations of



Fe<sup>2+</sup> to Fe<sup>3+</sup>, and the presence of iron impurities are located. On the Mohs scale of hardness Aquamarine has a 7.5. Aquamarines are mined in a number of exotic places including Nigeria, Madagascar, Zambia, Pakistan and Mozambique, but most of the gemstones available today come from Brazil.

## Chick'n & Dumplin's

Nita Dresner, of Scyene, Texas (long since disappeared from map)

### Chick'n & Broth:

Water 1 Onion Med. size cut into quarters 1 Carrot roughly chopped 2 Cups All-purpose Flour

1 Stalk Celery roughly chopped ½ Tsp Salt;

2 Cups Milk <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> Tsp Freshly Ground Pepper

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Tsp Sage <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Tsp Garlic (minced)

### **Dumplin's**:

4 Cups Chick'n Broth½ TspBaking Soda½ Tsp Salt3 TbspShortening¾ Cup Buttermilk½ TspSage



### **Chicken Broth:**

- 1. Place chick'n in a large pot with enough water to cover contents, carrot, onion, celery and salt. Bring to a boil, cover and simmer approximately 1 hour on low heat, or until chick'n is tender. (While chicken is cooking, refer to "Dumplin's" below.) Once chickin is tender remove it from the broth, allowing it time enough to cool for handling. Reserve the broth by strain contents of stew pot, discard (or set aside) veggies and return broth to stew pot. Bring the broth to a gentle boil.
- 2. Meanwhile debone the chickin, cut it into bite size pieces, and set aside.

#### **Dumplin's:**

- 1. While chickin is cooking; combine flour, baking soda and salt, and sage; cut in shortening using a pastry blender, or knives, until consistency of coarse meal.
- 2. Add buttermilk, stirring until just moisten.
- 3. Place dough upon floured surface, knead only 4 or 5 times -- <u>as less handling makes for a lighter and tender dumplin</u>. Roll dough to a 1/4-inch thickness, and cut into 3" x 1" strips.
- 4. When chickin broth is at a gentle boil, stir in milk, pepper, sage and garlic. Adjust seasonings to your taste.
- 5. One by one drop dumplin's into boiling broth; reduce heat to medium-low. Stir quiet often; to keep them from sticking together. Cook dumplin's 8 to 10 minutes.
- 6. Gently add chickin to dumplins and heat thoroughly. Remove from heat.

#### Hint:

For thicker broth: In a separate bowl; combine ½ cup flour with just enough cold water to dissolve flour, stirring to thicken. Add several cups of broth in a sauce pan, bring to a boil. Gradually add flour and water mixture to boiling broth, stirring constantly. When broth is thickened add it slowly while gently stirring, back into chickin and dumplin's stew pot. Ummmmm Ummmmm good!!!!
