Article of Interest - Computer Security

Is your computer protected? What does that really mean? For a long while I thought computer security was an Anti-Virus program. A computer virus is only one of many forms of computer malware – a short name for malicious software. In addition to viruses are worms, Trojan horses, spyware, adware, and probably a million other forms of malware. For emails there is also SPAM, phishing, spoofing, and bombing to name a few more.

How do viruses and other forms of malware get around? For years they traveled on disks which we loaded into our computer (new software, neat pictures from our friends, etc). Now, they generally hitch a ride on an email, especially an one with an enclosure, or on the Internet. Anti-virus program may catch them, especially the newer programs which monitor incoming mail and Internet files. What if the virus is hidden in a file? Your anti-virus software may declare the file as safe as you downloaded it, but you open it and a little built in un-encoding program unscrambles the virus and BINGO – you're had. My recommendation, if you get email with attachments you were not expecting, delete the email. Be careful of emails forwarded from a friend – a long list of forwards will lead you back to sources you do not know. Phishing is another matter. A legitimate looking email arrives and asks you to log on to a site which looks like a legitimate site (www.bankovamerica.com instead of www.bankofamerica.com) or wants you to "verify" you account. Do it and WHAM, you're had again. Do not (repeat – DO NOT) follow links in email, especially if you were not expecting an email from that source. Log on to your account; use your own links and passwords. If a source wants verification of your credit card information or to discuss a suspicious purchase, call the number on the back of your credit card and talk to the customer service representative. DO NOT use the number in the email or they got you again. Not too long ago, a Dallas area club member got an email to verify her email account information (I get these about twice a month). The email threatened to shut down her account if she did not comply; it all seemed legitimate. Using the link provided she verified her account, a few days later, everyone in her address book received a message she was in England; all her money and credit cards were stolen, please help, send money. Well, she wasn't in England, nothing had been stolen, but money was wired to the account and it all disappeared. Even though these web sites and emails can be awfully convincing, it really comes down to just using common sense; be suspicious and question everything. It is easier to click delete; if there is a real problem someone will contact you in person.

I thought an anti virus program was all I needed for security. Most anti-virus programs protect your computer from worms and viruses; they may not protect you from everything. For example, anti-virus programs will not protect your computer from "hackers" gaining access to your computer. If a hacker is successful, he has access of all information on your computer. Your file of credit card, bank account numbers, or passwords may be of interest to a hacker. To prevent someone from hacking in, a good "firewall" is necessary. A firewall monitors and controls data, incoming and outgoing over your network – if it looks suspicious, the firewall will generally block the access until you authorize the access.

Make sure your anti-virus program is checking incoming mail; a lot of malware comes in via email. If offered money or something else, don't be surprised if you receive a virus, adware or spyware. Be advised; if you respond, you are going to be inundated with a lot more of the same, from the same company and many other companies who bought your prime email address (prime because you responded) from the original source. A good thing to have is a SPAM or JUNK mail detector. It may take a while to train your JUNK mail program, but they filter out a lot. My GMAIL account receives 30+ pieces of junk mail for every valid email. My junk mail program catches more than 90 % of it so I receive only one or two pieces of junk mail a week. Once I recognize it as junk, I mark it and I am not bothered by that email address again. I thought my anti-virus program was enough; a windows firewall (not the best, but not bad), SPAM and JUNK mail protection on my email. Last year, I bought an Internet Security program (watch the big electronic and computer company advertisements (they often have free anti-virus and/or Internet security programs after rebates). Last month, our club's website was "stolen". Someone recognized the FTP software stream I was using to update the newsletter and added a few more files to the stream. When I next logged into our site, because of the Internet security program, my computer refused to load the site, indicating the site was re-directed to a known malicious site. Checking with our provider, they confirmed our site was re-directed to a web host in Africa. Redirection of sites is not uncommon (we could have pogmc.org and pogmc.com and simply re-direct one to the other location). I followed the Internet provider's suggestion of deleting and then reloading all the files on the server. I hope no one was caught up in the re-direction and ended up with a virus or worse. I do, however, wonder what the re-directed site would have been, but guess I will never know.

Bottom line: We live in an electronic age. It is hard to imagine doing without email or Internet. Protect yourself. If you need assistance get a good anti-virus program or an Internet security program. They take away a lot of the risk.

Birthstone of the Month

Tourmaline gemstone is the birthstone for October and the gemstone for the 8th wedding anniversary. The name Tourmaline comes from the Sinhalese (Sri Lanka) word tura mali meaning "stone of mixed colors". Tourmaline has color varieties of brown to yellow, blue, green, red, yellow, pink; but can be found colorless. Bi-colored and multicolored crystals are common. Crystals may even have a green end and a pink end, or green outside with a pink middle; the latter usually referred to as watermelon tourmaline.

Tourmaline can be found in igneous rocks, granite / granite pegmatite in metamorphic rocks like schist or marble. Other than that found in the United States tourmaline can be found in Brazil and Africa, with some gm size found in Tanzania, Nigeria, Kenya, Madagascar, Afghanistan, Pakistan.

In the United States, tourmaline was first discovered in 1822, in the state of Maine, then in California in the early 1900s. The Maine crystals were raspberry pink-red and minty greens. California crystals are bright pinks, and bicolor. In the early 1900s, these two states were the world's largest producers of gem tourmalines. Pink and green tourmaline was used by the Native Americans in funeral gifts for ages.

Folklore, Legend, and Healing Properties

Tourmaline' Ancient legend: It is found in all colors for it has travelled a rainbow, gathering all its colors along the way. Belief is, it will strengthen the body and spirit, and it is thought to inspire and nurture creativity and used by artists and writers extensively as a talisman.
