

The Eyes of Africa

The Eyes of Africa is the newest addition to the Perot Museum of Nature and Science It resides in the Lyda Hill Hall of Gems and Minerals. This is a spectacular piece. It is about 2 feet tall featuring a quartz spire growing from a quartz cluster base and clad with a layer of Alien Eye Fluorites.

Alien Eye fluorites are dark fluorites with a green square or diamond shaped center. When lighted from the back or side, the green looks like a pair of alien eyes staring at you. Alien Eye fluorites are only found in a few pockets in one mine in the Erongo Mountains of Namibia.

Herold Gariseb, a Namibian miner, found the Eyes of Africa along with other Alien Eye fluorites in 2007. Many of the specimens were sold, but Mr. Gariseb retained the Eyes of Africa, described



as the "largest and finest specimen of Alien Eyes fluorite". As he was fearful that the specimen would be stolen from his house, he stored it in the trunk of his white Mercedes. Years later, Mark Kielbasa and Jurgen Tron heard rumors of the find and eventually tracked down the specimen, still in the trunk of the Mercedes. A deal was closed, but it still had to be shipped to the United States without damage. To that end, the specimen as wrapped in 400 diapers and placed inside a 50-gallon barrel. The method of shipping was described as unconventional, but it worked.

Shipping of the specimen took about three months. Then it was another two years for the specimen to be cleaned and prepared. Passing through a number of hands, Lyda Hill eventually acquired the Eyes of Africa from Fine Minerals International. Lyda has loaned the Eyes of Africa to the Perot Museum on Nature and Science. If you get a chance, you should visit the museum.

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Editor's Corner – Be a Volunteer

Reading and gaining education is an option. So is keeping fit. However, what else can one do? How about something to help others? Within our hobby (or any hobby), you could volunteer to be a club or federation officer. You could help the organization by being an active committee member. You could also help by supporting your club's newsletter – taking on an article or poem or even being the editor. Still, being a volunteer in a club or Federation is not all that time consuming.

So what else could you do? Community service may be an option. Helping in a food bank, an animal rescue organization, a senior service center, or even building a house with the Habitat for Humanity organization may be a good option. If you are a "people person" then schools, libraries, museums and the like may be a good fit. I think that if you look around a little bit you will find many options.

When I first joined Pleasant Oaks, I wondered how I could help. I volunteered to help with the newsletter and found myself the assistant editor. A few months later the editor abruptly quit; suddenly I was the editor. I struggled for a couple of months learning more about the tasks, and it eventually became easier. The easier it was, the more I enjoyed it. A few years later, I went to one of the SCFMS conventions for the Editor's Breakfast. The person who was running the SCFMS Bulletin Editor and Author Contest (BEAC) was leaving and they were struggling to find a replacement. I tried it, stumbling through the first year's contest. Then I found a few ways to simplify things and started enjoying it. I have continued this practice through the years and am now the SCFMS Treasurer. I feel that I am helping the Federation, and thus I am helping the hobby.

Sometimes volunteer opportunities have unique ways of rewarding you. About five years ago, Mr. Tommy Diamond gave a presentation about the Perot Museum and the efforts in finding and displaying the Alamosaurus neck bones and cast of the huge sauropod that was going to be displayed. That sounded interesting, so I contact the museum and found that they were actively seeking volunteers. Out of interest, I applied and was accepted. Now I am a docent in the Gem and Mineral Hall and the Life: Then and Now Hall (dinosaur hall). I get to look at the fantastic displays and have a chance to study and learn about them. I do not have an extensive mineral or fossil collection, but the Museum surely does. I can examine the displays and take pictures of them. I can share the information in our club's newsletter, but more importantly, I have the opportunity to talk and share with museum patrons. I did not realize I liked talking to strangers, but found that I just had to find the right topic first. I also did not think I liked large groups of small children, but once again, it was just finding out the right topics to interact with them, so now I help in the youth camp programs.

Do you have a little bit or time to spare? Perhaps you should consider being a volunteer – it is better than sitting around being bored. The opportunities are there, you just need to look a little to see if you can help. If you do not see what you want, go to Google and search "volunteer match" – you will be surprised how many organization there are who will help you to find the right opportunity. Volunteering can be rewarding, often beyond just personal gratification. Over the years I have know many (granted, younger) volunteers being offered position with a company or organization. Being a volunteer gave them the background and experience; key elements for an employer looking to fill a position. Still, it is not about the job that may or may not be there, it is about helping and the good feelings that come from helping. My recommendation is to try being a volunteer. If you enjoy it then that is great; if it is not your cup of tea there is no stigma in leaving.

JUST A DROP

Hobby shops and model airplane stores carry small plastic dispenser bottles that are handy for putting a drop of flux, oil, or glue just where you want it. They have a length of small metal tubing coming out the top


that lets you squeeze out very small drops.

I use one with a short length of tubing for oil when I'm sawing or when drilling harder metals like steel. Another bottle I found in a plastics store has a longer length of metal tubing on it. Plastics people use them for dispensing fast drying glues to join pieces of acrylic. The long metal tube lets you reach into tight places. Either of these is handy for flux at the soldering station.


