September Birthstone - Sapphire

The major Birthstone lists all have a single birthstone for September, Sapphire. Sapphire is a variety of corundum, the defining entry for the Mohs Hardness scale of nine. Only two natural minerals are harder than

corundum. They are Moissanite (9.25) and Diamond (10). Sapphires come in a variety of colors except red. A red variety of corundum exists – it is known as Ruby. Both varieties of corundum are chemically the same. They are Aluminum Oxide (Al₂O₃). Trace elements are responsible for the differing colors of sapphire. Iron and tungsten impart a blue hue to sapphire. Iron by itself can yield a yellow to green sapphire. Iron and chromium impurities can yield a purple sapphire. Padparadscha sapphires are the rarest variety of corundum. The color of the Padparadscha ranges from orangish-pink to pinkish-orange; the color, like the purple sapphire, is caused by the presence of both iron and chromium. It is the balance between the iron and chromium ions and the valence state of the iron and chromium that determines if the stone is going to be purple or the orangish hue of the padparadscha sapphire. Sapphire without any trace elements will be colorless.

Sapphires may exhibit asterism – a star sapphire. The star is caused by in inclusion of strands of rutile (titanium oxide). Both 6 and 12-legged stars have been found, but the 12-pointed star sapphire is extremely



rare. When a star is found in a sapphire, it is always cut as a cabochon.

Almost all sapphires are heat-treated to improve the clarity of the stone, and often to enhance the color of the stone. One exception is the Yogo sapphire found exclusively in Montana's Yogo Gulch. Their color is often described as "cornflower blue". Sapphires were one of the earliest stones to be lab-grown. Padparadscha sapphires can be enhanced by a process known as beryllium lattice diffusion. It has also been found that beryllium lattice diffusion can change a very dark blue sapphire into a more marketable lighter-colored blue stone.
